

## New to Boxwell Program in 2024 Overview

Thank you all for taken the time to help make this camp better as we have compiled your ideas, comments and thoughts about Summer Camp. This year we have made many changes to the program and wanted to put them together in one location.

1) In years past we have had many issues with the transportation system at camp getting our youth to merit badge classes. This year we are doing more of a block system where scouts now go to one class a day and work to complete the merit badge instead of going back and forth hourly. We understand that some classes need more time than a day and may need additional help such as more time or just need to finish qualifying for a merit badge. In the schedule we have allocated this time on Thursday



- morning to help finish up merit badges or if we had a weather delay on a day. Thursday is to be more of a free day with the instructional option in the morning and open areas and activities in the afternoon. This will allow Troops to do activities together such as troop going to the range together and shooting as a Troop, or going canoeing etc. Please refer to the Merit badge schedule and Boxwells Daily Schedule for reference. Troops Should prepare program for this Thursday. This is a great opportunity for youth leadership of the unit to shine.
- 2) We have created a new First year Scout program titled Brownsea and will be located at Beany Elam where scouts can work on Tenderfoot— First Class Ranks all in a weeks time. This program will also allow scouts to earn the Scouting Heritage Merit Badge and see the new Museum at camp. For information please see page 15 for more information
- 3) Usually during camp on Friday we have a campfire on Friday night and 80% of scouts leave before campfire. This year we are going to move our signature campfire to Thursday night to ensure we have a better quality program, hand out awards and recognize scouts on there achievement during camp. On Friday we will still have our Family Night so scouts can show their parents this amazing place at Boxwell Reservation. Friday night for troops that stay we will be offering an Ice Cream Social at the Dining Hall with our staff.
- 4) This Years theme is "Olympics Games" as we are all going for GOLD at Boxwell. During the Summer the real Olympics will be happening and we are going to have our own Olympics right here at Boxwell, with troop competitions and more. We will be handing out medals at camp and will be awarding three troops the Gold, Silver and Bronze medals on Thursday night at campfire.
- 5) This years new program for Shooting Sports is our new Action Archery program at Parnell. This new Sporting Arrows program is not only new to archery in Scouting, but also to the archery world in general and Boxwell Reservation. Similar to clay target shooting, sporting arrows are centered around automatic target launchers that throw 10-inch diameter foam targets into the air. And once the targets take flight? It's on. This Program is a lot of fun and very challenging. Must be 14 years or older. We also created a Davy Crockett shooting sports program where scouts can shoot a muzzleloader and throw a tomahawk.
- 6) Time Changes to programs: Triathlon is moved to Thursdays at 10 am at Fehrmann. OA Cracker Barrel is now moved to 7:45 pm on Wednesday.
- 7) Lunch on Thursday is a Grab and Go Lunch to help give you more time to for open Programs.
- 8) We also added a new Merit Badge to the Skilled Trades Program Woodwork.

With all these new changes to make our Program at Boxwell Reservation better serve our youth, please be patient with us as we try this new and exciting program at Boxwell. I know we will encounter new issues and things that we haven't thought of. Please know we are listening and trying to strive to do better at Boxwell.

# **History of Boxwell**

Boxwell Reservation is named for the late Mr. Leslie G. Boxwell, a distinguished Tennessean and Scouter. There have been four "Boxwells" in total: Linton, Tennessee (1921-29), Narrows of the Harpeth (1930-48), Rock Island (Charles E. Parish Wilderness Preserve near McMinnville) (1949-59), and the present one. In 1938, the Order of the Arrow's Wa-Hi -Nasa Lodge #111 was founded at the Narrows of the Harpeth. In 1951, the South's first Wood Badge course was offered at the Rock Island camp. In 1952, the original site was

located on what would become Old Hickory Lake. In 1957, the Middle Tennessee Council, through a special act of Congress, acquired the title for 528 acres of land from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers for a small fee of \$1.00. Subsequent purchases brought its size up to 1,273 acres. The summer of 1960 was the first season for summer camp at our Boxwell.

Each Boxwell has provided great outdoor experiences for Scouts and adult leaders, and made its own contribution to the camping traditions of the Middle Tennessee Council. Today's Boxwell Reservation on Old Hickory Lake reflected and accelerated the rapid growth of Scouting in Middle Tennessee. Many people have worked hard to raise funds and make the arrangements necessary to acquire and develop our camps. Boxwell Reservation is located on Old Hickory Lake in Wilson County on State Highway 109, five miles south of Gallatin near LaGuardo, Tennessee. This beautiful location harbors rolling hills, excellent campsites, and numerous hiking trails. The waters of Old Hickory Lake are excellent for swimming, canoeing, fishing and

other aquatic activities, making it a goldmine for adventure and merit badge achievement alike. Nearly every kind of tree native to Tennessee can be found on the reservation, and animal life is plentiful. Some evidence exists to suggest that the ground beneath is honeycombed with caves, and it is believed that Indian and

pioneer trails crossed it. For these reasons and more, it is well-suited for meeting the needs of Scout units of the Middle Tennessee Council and beyond. The camps within the reservation are named for other

outstanding citizens and Scouters. The developed camps include Camp Stahlman, Camp Parnell, Camp Craig, Cubworld and the Percy Dempsey Camporee Site. Camp Light, Explorer Island, and Camp Beany Elam have been kept as wilderness sites. Boxwell Reservation is rich in tradition and widely considered one of the best summer camp facilities in the United States.

# **Twelve Day Out Pre-Camp Meeting**

Important items that will be covered at the pre-camp meeting

- Pay balance of camp, if not already paid in full.
   Units who have not paid in full by 12 day out meeting will be charged an additional \$50 processing fee.
- Verify the number of attendees for your unit— youth and adults
- Learn about summer camp program changes/updates
- Turn in copies of medical forms and review medical screening procedures
- Review MERIT BADGE SCHEDULES and make necessary changes
- Review assignment of check-in time and procedures for summer camp
- Review dining hall procedures and let the staff know of dietary needs
- Get any additional questions you have answered



# **Provisional Camper**

Some Scouts are unable to attend Boxwell with their troop. We want all Scouts to have the opportunity to attend. Scouts can sign up as provisional camper and the council will put them with a unit attending camp. Once a Scout is connected with an attending unit, Scout, parents, and unit leaders will work together to help the Scout become part of the unit for the summer camp week. # **Second Week Camper**

Scouts who choose to attend more than one week of camp at Boxwell can also take advantage of the Second week Camper opportunity. Scouts will be charged for each additional week. Because no scheduled activities are provided over the weekend, scouts are required to depart with their troops on Saturday and return on Sunday after 1:00 PM. # **Scouts BSA Girls at Summer Camp**

The Middle Tennessee Council welcomes female Scouts at our Scout Camps. To ensure that all Scouts have the best possible experience, all female youth Scouts BSA attending summer camp must be a registered part of a female Troop attending camp with sufficient adult supervision. Thus, a Scouts BSA male Troop cannot bring female Scouts with them, and a female Troop cannot bring male Scouts with them. Male and Female Troops cannot share the same campsite.

# **Frequently Asked Questions**

Question: Can Scouts BSA female Troops be combined with Scouts BSA male Troops in the same Campsite?

Answer: No. Program integrity requires single gender units occupy the same campsite. For details on unit leadership requirements, review the Barriers to Abuse.

### Question: What are the unit leadership requirements?

Answer: Two registered adult leaders 21 years of age or over are required at all Scouting activities, including meetings. There must be a registered female adult leader 21 years of age or over in every unit serving females. A registered female adult leader 21 years of age or over must be present for any activity involving female youth. Notwithstanding the minimum leader requirements, age- and program-appropriate supervision must always be provided. (Youth Protection and Barriers to Abuse FAQs can be found online at www.scouting.org)

All adults accompanying a Scouting unit who are present at the activity for 72 total hours or more must be registered as leaders. The 72 hours need not be consecutive.

### Question: Are there guidelines for swimwear?

Answer: Appropriate attire is required for all activities. BSA's National Aquatics Subcommittee recommends: Swimsuits should be comfortable, functional and modest. For males, swim trunks or board shorts are appropriate. Modest tankinis or one-piece swimsuits for females. Inappropriate swimwear includes swim briefs or swim bottoms short enough to allow exposure and bikinis.

Question: Can a parent bring their daughter to camp with their son's Troop?

Answer: No. Program integrity requires single gender units.

# Question: What if female Scouts BSA want to attend summer camp but insufficient adult leadership is available from the Troop?

Answer: The Middle Tennessee Council encourages small Troops to share a campsite when attending summer camp, so they can provide the adult leadership for their Scouts. Another option is the Middle Tennessee Council provisional program for both male and female Scouts where individual Scouts are placed in a male or female Troop for their summer camp experience.

# Communication

# **Sunday Check In**

- Arrive together as a Troop PLEASE arrive at your designated check-in time to help with traffic and organization.
- Drive to your respective camp.
- At your camp, unload your gear at the site marker near the parking lot. If you have a trailer, please let the staff know you need to take it to your campsite.
- Staff will escort your troop to your camp site and help unload your gear. Once gear and/or trailer are unloaded, park your vehicle (s) in the parking lot as directed by the staff.
- A leader will need to check in with Camp and Program Directors & Medical Staff in the Dining Hall.
- After check-in, your site commissioner will take your unit on a camp tour and to the waterfront.

# **Medical Screening**

The Scoutmaster or adult leader will be notified at check-in of any youth or adults who must review medical forms with the Camp Medical Officer. This will also include those medical forms not submitted at Twelve Day Out Meeting. Everyone that comes to camp must have a valid medical form. In accordance with BSA requirements, any participant without a fully completed form and copy of an insurance card will not be allowed to remain at camp or participate in any events until the health form is submitted. Additionally, during the screening, should any participant exhibit signs of illness that may be contagious, they will be asked to return home.

Please bring a First-Aid Kit for your troop

### Insurance

Each troop in the Middle Tennessee Council is covered by supplemental accident and sickness insurance. This will insure them at camp as well as at all other Scouting functions. Benefits are to cover deductibles or co-pays. Please submit a copy of your Scout's primary insurance card with their physical form. If a Scout is not covered under other insurance, please submit a signed statement from the parent stating this.

\*Note: The Middle Tennessee Council does NOT insure troops visiting from outside the Council. Troops must have insurance either through their Troops or through their home Council.

Please send proof of insurance along with your initial Summer Camp registration.

### **Swim Test**

As a part of Safe Swim Defense and Safety Afloat, we are required to perform swim classification tests at camp and must renew them each year. Your scouts will visit the waterfront on their camp tour where they will learn safety procedures, waterfront and swimming pool rules, collect buddy tags and wrist bands, and take swim tests. Proceed to the waterfront even if you have completed your \*swim checks prior to camp.

\*SPECIAL NOTE: When swim tests are conducted away from camp, the camp aquatics director retains the right to review or retest any or all participants to ensure that standards have been maintained.

# **Bikes at Camp**

We welcome anyone that would like to bring their bicycle to camp. Keep in mind that cyclists must follow all BSA policies while riding, which includes wearing a helmet. Scouts or adults who do not have a helmet on when riding the bike will have to put up for the week. We do not allow bicycles until after adults have removed all cars from the campsites. This is for the overall safety of all our participants. There will be a bicycle safety course offered on Sunday after dinner and a tag will be issued upon completion. If any camper cannot attend, they should set a time with staff to get certified individually.

### \*Swimming Attire for all participants:

Swimsuits should be comfortable, functional and modest. For males, swim trunks or board shorts are appropriate. Tight-fitting swim briefs or swim bottoms short enough to allow exposure are not allowed. For females, bikinis are not allowed. Modest tankinis or one-piece swimsuits are appropriate.

Campsites are located throughout the wooded areas of camp. Each site has access to a shower house which includes a water faucet. Tents are approximately 9'6" by 7'6" and are placed on platforms throughout each campsite. [Any equipment or camp property damaged by the Troop will be replaced by the Troop. The Troop is financially responsible for any monetary loss to the Council].

# **Merit Badge Program**

The Camping Committee has developed a list of recommended merit badges based upon the Scout's year at camp. Scoutmasters have the option of sending Scouts to merit badge classes not recommended for their camp year. Please use your best judgment in determining if a Scout is ready to earn a merit badge. All merit badges offered are listed here.

There are several merit badges that require extensive work and cannot be completed at camp. Scouts can either fulfill those requirements prior to camp, in which case they will complete the merit badge, or they may elect to partially complete the merit badge and finish the work in the future. Scouts are asked to review merit badge requirements online to be prepared for class. Camp class time is used for practical applications and demonstration of skill proficiency. Please do not expect counselors, staff, or Scoutmasters to sign off on badges not truly earned. Camp is not a merit badge factory where you show up and receive the merit badges.

Boxwell Reservation offers a wide variety of programs. The staff is committed to working with your troop to meet your needs. In addition to the programs listed in the following pages, troops with special program requests should relay these to your camp program director who will work with you and the camp staff to make your stay at Boxwell rewarding. These programs have been designed to meet the needs of all Scouts, new, returning and veterans alike. Please take time to design your troop's program to meet the needs of the Scouts in your unit.

# First-Year Program Suggestions

**New First year Scout Program BROWNSEA;** is designed for scouts in their first years at Boxwell. The program emphasizes basic scouting skills, teamwork and requirements toward rank advancement. For more information on Brownsea please refer to page 15 in the guide. If your scouts are not taking Brownsea we would recommend taken Rifle Shooting, Weather, Basketry and First Aid.



Astronomy: Must go to Star Party on Monday Night. Basketry: Kit will be given to Scout. First Aid: Must bring own home made First Aid Kit. Fishing: must bring own pole and tackle. Leatherwork: Kit will be given to Scout. Music: must bring own instrument. Scouting Heritage: Will need to complete 5 & 6. Space Exploration: Kit will be given to Scout Wood Carving: Need to bring own leather gloves that fit, kit will be given to Scout.

# Second Year Merit Badge Program (Including all Merit Badges offered at the First Year level)



Forestry: Will need a blank field book. Personal Fitness: Bring clothes to work out in and tennis shoes. Pioneering: Suggestions is to bring work gloves. Swimming: Must pass swimmers test. If doesn't pass can take Instructional swim at waterfront.

# Third Year and Longer Merit Badge Program (Including all Merit Badges offered at the First and Second Year level)



Canoeing: Bring water shoes. Climbing: Closed toe shoes, gloves, water bottle. Motorboating: hat, sunscreen, water bottle. Rowing: Bring water shoes. ### ROY GRINDSTAFF SKILLED TRADES PROGRAM AT PARNELL























Boxwell is excited to support the need for more well-trained skilled trades workers in our country while simultaneously offering scouts additional merit badges to be earned during summer camp. The Middle Tennessee Council has created a Skilled Trades program at Boxwell Reservation. The Roy Grindstaff Skilled Trades Center is equipped with both service bays and classroom space. Merit Badges include: Welding, Automotive Maintenance, Plumbing, Painting, Home Repairs, Electricity, Architecture, American Business, American Labor, Drafting and Workwork. \*

\*Automotive Maintenance, Plumbing, Painting, Woodwork and Home Repairs participants are asked to wear close-toed shoes and clothes that can get dirty. Welding is asked the same plus a long-sleeved shirt for safety. Woodwork need gloves.

# Brownsea -The First Year Scout Program

This new program is designed for scouts in their first years in Scouting. The program emphasizes basic scouting skills, teamwork and requirements toward rank advancement. 


### **Hot Shot Award**

# Snorkeling, BSA

The Snorkeling, BSA requirements introduce Scout-age children and adult leaders to the special skills, equipment, and safety precautions associated with snorkeling; encourage the development of aquatics skills that promote fitness and recreation; and provide a foundation for those who later will participate in more advanced underwater activity.

Individuals completing the official requirements qualify for a recognition card and swimsuit patch. The completed award application should be submitted to the local council service center by the merit badge counselor or unit leader. All requirements must be completed as stated on the application form. The counselor may not omit, vary, or add requirements.

In order for Scouts to complete the award they must complete all requirements during the Scout's week at Summer Camp. Participants who complete the snorkeling award requirements may purchase the patch from the Trading Post (expect to show your card certifying completion).

#### WEDNESDAY AND FRIDAY

We would like to encourage scouts to bring their own snorkeling gear to ensure that each scout has a pair that fits. Full Face snorkeling masks and integrated snorkels are not allowed and cannot be used for these classes.

# Mile Swim, BSA



The Mile Swim is offered everyday at the waterfront at 7:00 am MUST EAT B MEAL. Interested Scouts and Leaders/Adults must pass BSA Swimmer Test and be second-year camper.

MUST PARTICIPATE IN DAILY PRACTICES MONDAY – THURSDAY MORNINGS at 7 AM AND BE TO BE ABLE TO PARTICIPATE IN THE MILE SWIM ON FRIDAY AT 9:15 AM.

# Scuba, BSA

Scuba BSA introduces qualified Scout participants to the special skills, equipment, and safety precautions associated with scuba diving; encourages aquatics activities that promote fitness and recreation; and provides a foundation for those who later will participate in more advanced underwater activity.

The Scuba BSA experience contains two parts - Knowledge Development and Water Skills Development. During the first part, participants learn basic dive safety information and overview skills to be used during their water experience. Must be a swimmer

The Water Skills Development session introduces essential dive skills, such as mask clearing, regulator clearing, and alternate air source use.

# **BSA Lifeguard**



The BSA Lifeguard Program is offered each week to Scouts 15 years and older and leaders who have significant aquatic experience and strong aquatics skills'. Candidates for BSA Lifeguard must spend 30 hours on the waterfront. BSA Lifeguard Individual should complete First Aid and CPR certifications (Professional Rescuer from Red Cross or American Heart Association) prior to attending camp and will need to show verification of completion of requirements.

# **BSA Stand Up Paddleboarding (SUP) Award**

The BSA Stand Up Paddle boarding award introduces Scouts to the basics of Stand up paddle boarding on calm water, including skills equipment, self rescue and Safety precautions. This award also encourages Scouts to develop paddling skills that promote fitness and safe aquatics recreation. This is taught at both waterfronts.



# Jet Ski / TWRA Boat License Program



# **Dolphin Society**

The Dolphin Society Award is available to scouts who have completed the following:





- 3. Complete one of the following: Mile Swim or BSA Scuba
- 4. Complete one of the following Additional Opportunities: Snorkeling, Stand Up Paddle (SUP) or Board Sailing.

The belt buckle and patch are available at the Trading Post.



These classes allow swimmers to work on Instructional and Stroke Develop skills at each waterfront. A scout will learn good habits in, on, and near water, become comfortable in the water, learn and refine new strokes, and become stronger, safer swimmers. If a scout is having trouble passing the swim test and is classified as "non-swimmer," this class is designed to help that scout. [For Scouts that have passed the swim test, they will work on the Stroke Development part of the program and is intended for scouts who have passed the BSA Swimmer's Test but do not know all of the five required strokes for Swimming merit badge]. This session will instruct participants on the five basic strokes, skill improvement, and stamina in order that they be prepared to take the Swimming merit badge in the future. We encourage all scouts that is in need of help in swimming to take these opportunities, to be come a stronger swimmer. They will be taught on Monday and Tuesday.



### **BSA Swim Test**

The various components of each test evaluate the skills essential to the minimum level of swimming ability. Each step of the test is important and should be followed as listed below:

<u>SWIMMER'S TEST</u>: Jump feetfirst into water over the head in depth. Level off and swim 75 yards in a strong manner using one or more of the following strokes: sidestroke, breaststroke, trudgen, or crawl; then swim 25 yards using an easy resting backstroke. The 100 yards must be completed in one swim without stops and must include at least one sharp turn. After completing the swim, rest by floating.

<u>BEGINNER'S TEST</u>: Jump feetfirst into water over the head in depth, level off, and swim 25 feet on the surface. Stop, turn sharply, resume swimming, and return to the starting place.

NON-SWIMMER TEST: Anyone who has not completed either the beginner or swimmer tests is classified as a nonswimmer. however all are encouraged to get in the water.

Swimming Merit Badge Scouts Must Be Swimmers, and should be familiar, and able to swim with the front crawl/trudgen, side stroke, breaststroke, Back Crawl, and Backstroke. They also must be able to swim these strokes in a strong matter. If scouts need help/improvement in these areas, please register them for the Stroke Development class.

# **Trail of Courage Program**

In 2017, the Middle Tennessee Council began a program at Boxwell Reservation called the Trail of Courage. The program continues today as it encourages young men and women toward making healthy life choices. Leaders over the course of the week will speak to your scouts daily about this program in the campsite. Where you will review these topics with your scout. For reference please review the Trail of Courage Booklet giving to each troop at check in. The Trail of Courage Program opens scouts up to healthy discussions about topics such as fitness, nutrition, and overall healthy choices. The booklet also highlights the negative effects and consequences associated with the use of Tobacco.





# **COPE - Challenging Outdoor Personal Experience**

### **Basic COPE**

Who: Scouts First Class and above, physically fit, 13 or older

Purpose: To promote teamwork and decision-making Cost: \$35 (in addition to the Summer Camp fee)

When: Two Block sessions Monday and Tuesday or then Wednesday and Friday all day

What: COPE is both challenging and fun!

Each of the 30 obstacles contains new problems to be solved by the group creating opportunities for both personal growth and team-building. To achieve completion, participants will need to commit to the full morning or afternoon program time allotted. Participants can take regular merit badge sessions for the other half of each day. COPE will include learning belaying techniques.

### **Advanced COPE**

Who: Scouts who completed COPE in a previous summer.

Purpose: To build teamwork.



Careful consideration has been put into the preparation of our camp menu. Our goal is to provide scouts with well-balanced meals and good nutrition in adequate quantities to help them build strong bodies and find success in their overall camping experience. Available at each meal will be: condiments according to the meal being served, peanut butter and jelly, and salad bar with fruit (at the very least a choice of apple or banana). Cold cereal will be available in at least four flavors, juice will available in at least two flavors, and drink stations will have water and milk at all meals. Coffee is available for adults and staff. Non-carbonated drinks will be available for lunch and dinner. We regularly review surveys and take suggestions for meal ideas.

# **Dining Hall Information/Procedures**

Meals are served in our indoor, air-conditioned facilities. The dining hall will be set up to serve only the number needed for each serving period (meal). The maximum number allowed by the Fire Code will determine the number of tables and chairs allowed at each meal. Scouts may refuse offered items, but additional items will not be made available until "seconds" are served/announced.

Guests wishing to eat in the dining hall with their Scouts need to purchase meal tickets at the Crab. Prices are: \$6.00 Breakfast – \$7.00 Lunch – \$8.00 Dinner

### Procedure:

- Sunday afternoon tour will visit the Dining Hall where the troop will be assigned tables based on 1 table per 8 people in attendance at camp.
- Each troop will appoint two cleanup monitors per assigned table.
- At their designated mealtime, Troops will enter the Dining Hall silently and remain standing beside their assigned tables.
- After everyone has entered, all will remain silent during announcements and grace.
- Following grace, please be seated tables will be dismissed by proctors to line up for serving.
- 15 minutes prior to the end of the meal period, all are encouraged to participate in a program.
- Following program, everyone will be dismissed except the table monitor.
- At this time the clean up window will open and monitors may return trays and clean tables.

If you have special dietary needs, please inform camp staff at the Twelve Day Out Meeting so that the appropriate provisions can be made prior to your arrival at camp. Allergies are a growing concern for many in our society. As our desire is for each scout to have the best possible camp experience, we encourage those with allergies to consider bringing your own food if it would be more comfortable. If you decide to bring your own food, we will provide proper storage and assist you in warming it as necessary. # **Leader Appreciation Dinner**

On Thursday evening at 5:30 pm, leaders are invited to attend an Appreciation Dinner at Cubworld Dining Hall. There will be a brief program and time to connect/communicate with other leaders at Boxwell this week. We hope



that you will receive this gift from the Middle Tennessee Council as a special thank you for all that you do. Leaders registered at camp all week will be provided with tickets to the dinner. If you need additional tickets for other guests planning to attend, they are available at the Crab for just \$8 each.

## **Adult Leadership**

Each unit must have responsible adult leadership. Each unit in camp is required to have at least two adult leaders present at all times. Units that are unable to secure two-deep leadership should contact their district committee to make arrangements to combine with another unit or make other arrangements for their Scouts at Summer Camp. Leaders must be present day and night. Both leaders must be at least 21 years of age. For female units, at least one of the leaders must also be female. ALL UNITS MUST BRING THE LEADERSHIP Boxwell summer Camp Staff is not responsible for your Troops leadership.

# Camp Security - Visitors at Camp

It is of vital importance for security to be aware of those on property. While we do have security cameras at the camp entrance, we ask ALL visitors to check in at the Admin Building (Crab). Please park across from the building to check in. Be sure to sign in upon arrival and sign out before you leave.

Everyone on property must wear identification that signifies legitimate participation in the program. Wrist-bands, such as those used in hospitals, are Boxwell's method of identification. Units will be reminded during check-in and throughout the week of the importance of this safety procedure.

Persons in camp without either a visitor's nametag or camp participant wristband will be escorted to the office to sign in (staff personnel must determine if that person is eligible to remain on camp property).

# **Family Night**

Friday nights are a special night at camp. If you'd like to join us for dinner, we would be delighted for you to see and experience some of what your scout has throughout the week. Family members can join scouts for dinner (just \$8.00 each - tickets at the Crab). After dinner, you'll have some time to see the unit's campsite and camp!

### Important details:

- 1) ALL Visitors Must Check-in at the Crab.
- 2) You can arrive anytime after 4:30 on Friday.
- 3) Please let your scoutmaster/unit leader know ahead of time if you plan to attend. This will help both your unit and the Dining Hall to plan accordingly.
- 4) Feel free to visit the Trading Post (hours are Sunday 1:00 p.m. 10:00 p.m. and Friday 7:30 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.)

# **Early Scout Release from Camp**

Boxwell Reservation is required to check Scouts out of camp with adults who are approved by the camp unit leader or the parent's name that appears on the Scout's medical form. Scouts are to be checked out at the Crab.

# **Vehicles in Camp**

The Health & Safety Committee and Camping Committee have established Policy and Procedures for safely managing Vehicles in Camp. The policy follows the guidelines established in the Guide to Safe Scouting as they relate to Boxwell Scout Reservation.

- NO PRIVATE VEHICLES will be allowed beyond the camp parking lot for any reason other than documented disability or pre-approved vehicles used to pull trailers to campsites for the delivery of troop and personal gear.
- Weather permitting, trailers will be allowed in campsites. However, vehicles
  used to pull trailers must return to the designated parking lot within one hour of
  delivering the trailer to the campsite.
- Personal gear of campers and troops without trailers will be transported to and from the campsite by camp personnel using camp vehicles.
- All parking must be confined to designated parking lots.
- All program and administration sites are within convenient walking distance of all campsites.
- CAMP-WIDE SPEED LIMIT IS 25 MPH / WITHIN CAMPSITES 5 MPH
- No one under the age of 18 will be allowed to drive on the Reservation; with the exception of arriving at respective camp parking lot.
- Visitors must park in the visitor parking lot and check in at the Crab before proceeding to camp. NO PARK-ING ALONG ROAD!!
- After checking-in, please proceed to the designated parking lot in your respective camp.
- Safety belt restraints are required at all times in all vehicles while on reservation. The passenger number per car is not to exceed the number of safety belts in the vehicle.
- BSA Policy states "there is no riding in the back of a pickup truck or a trailer, covered or uncovered."
- For safety & conservation, vehicles used in camp will be limited to individuals designated as Administrative Staff.

# **Bus Information**

It is important for Scouts to be on time, to know where they are going, and to be able to move about Boxwell with ease. The size of Boxwell Reservation can make this a challenging task as Merit Badge classes are spread across the Reservation. The bus is provided for Scouts and classes have built-in accounts for travel time, but Scouts should also be diligent about how they manage their time. Scouts are expected to be courteous and kind and will be reported for destruction or lack of self-discipline on the bus.

# **Buddy System**

For the safety and security of our Scouts, we strongly encourage the buddy system be adapted by leaders at every campsite and that scouts not leave the campsite without a buddy. The buddy systems helps scouts travel through camp without issue or incident. Scouts should not wander off alone. Leaders and camp staff will often ask Scouts, "Where's your buddy?" Please help us implement this valuable measure at Boxwell by educating your unit on best buddy system practices.



# **Around the Campsite**

# Fires, Firefighting and Fuel Policy

The danger of fire exists everywhere in camp. The camp staff is prepared to handle firefighting in camp, but you should be prepared to stop or slow the fire until help arrives. Fireguard charts are furnished and must be posted in camp and should be inspected daily by the unit leader to see that responsibilities are assigned and carried out. Failure to sign the Fireguard Chart will result in an unsatisfactory mark during campsite inspection. National BSA policy permits the use of liquid fuel only under the direct supervision of a knowledgeable adult leader. Gasoline (Fuels, flammable liquids) and other flammable substances are to be stored in the approved fuel storage area in camp (Contact the Camp Commissioner). You must take your empty fuel tanks with you when you leave camp! Open flames (i.e. candles, Sterno, kerosene lanterns, cigarettes, etc.) are strictly prohibited in tents. Fire extinguishers are provided at each site and should not be played with or removed from the site. Fire extinguishers remain on the property of Boxwell Reservation.

If a Extinguisher is discharged from horseplaying the Troop will be charged \$100 to help pay to refill.

# **Restricted Campers**

Summer Camp is for youth in the Scout BSA Program. Participants must be registered in Scouts BSA. <u>Other youth, including Cubs, Webelos, Venturers and siblings are NOT allowed as part of the camp week.</u>

### **Shower House**

Boxwell Shower Houses are designed for troops. Sites will be asked to help clean and maintain shower houses throughout the week. Please make our camp staff aware of any needs related to the shower houses. Bring your own soap and toiletries. Remember that a scout is clean and as such is tasked with taking personal responsibility to keep restrooms and shower houses as clean as possible. Please remember to shut and lock the door behind you when using the restroom. We respectfully ask that two leaders help supervise/inspect/monitor facilities during peak usage hours at camp.

### **Footwear**

Shoes must be worn at all times while in camp. <u>Open-toed sandals, clogs, crocs, and flip-flops are NOT permitted</u>. Please advise any visitors of this policy prior to the start of camp. Shower shoes should be worn while in the shower area. No bare feet allowed!

## **General Cleanliness**

Please be clean in all that you do. Trash barrels are provided in each campsite and throughout camp. Please always do your best to leave camp better than you found it.

# **Pet Policy**

Pets are not permitted at camp.
This applies to staff, leaders,
campers, and visitors.

### **CPAP**

Please maintain the National Jamboree standard of using a battery-powered machine.

# **Curfew**

No Scout will be allowed to leave their campsites after 10:00 PM unless accompanied by two adults.

# **Health and Safety**

A safe and enjoyable experience has always been the focus of Scouts BSA. The camping experience at Boxwell Reservation is no exception. In the event of an emergency, Boxwell has immediate response capability with a Wilson County Emergency Management team located only three (3) miles away. We also have Emergency Medical Staff onsite (working out of the Health Lodge) and available by radio contact 24/7. Sumner Regional is located just five (5) miles from Boxwell and is a state-of-the-art medical facility that has provided care and support to the surrounding area for 60 years. Emergency transportation by ambulance is only a radio call away, and we have established a Pre-designated Emergency Landing Area (PELA) with Vanderbilt Life Flight. The Wilson County Sheriff's Department makes random checks of our facility and is ready to assist in the event of any emergency.

### Health lodge number is 615-997-5625

The Middle Tennessee Council Health & Safety Committee has determined that for the safety of Scouts and adults at camp, everyone that comes to camp must understand that it is a privilege to be at Boxwell. If medical attention or recommendation is refused, the patient may be asked to leave Boxwell. Boxwell Reservation takes the safety of each camper very seriously and pledges to do the utmost to see that they have a safe and enjoyable environment in which to pursue the great ideals of Scouting.

We understand the Mental, Emotional and Social Health (MESH) we are in the planning stages of having this at camp.

# **Camp Emergencies**

With the exception of a Weather Emergency, all campers are to report immediately to flagpole upon hearing the emergency signal. In the case of a Weather Emergency, campers should seek protective shelter. Once the Weather Emergency has passed, campers should report to their campsites. Campers should remain in the campsites until the "All Clear" signal has been given. Leaders should review these procedures with their campers.

### The following emergency signal will be used:

In an inclement weather we will sound the alarm

- The alarm will sound like (air raid siren)
- When this I heard, make your way to your perspective Dining Hall for further information
- When its Safe to go back to your Camp site we will sound another alarm that will sound like (five short beeps 9X)

### **Boltech System**

A lightning detection system has been installed at Boxwell. Lightning can be detected several miles away and warnings given to the campers. We also monitor the Wilson Emergency Management Association channel. They contact us for any emergencies that arise. NOAA-Weather station is monitored 24/7 at the reservation.

# **Emergency Action Plan**

In the event of a camp emergency, notify the Camp Director, Program Director, Camp Ranger, and/or the Camp Medical Office immediately. Where an emergency involving a camper is concerned, the appropriate Scoutmaster should be contacted. Emergency phone numbers are posted at each phone location.





# **Trading Post**


Trading Posts are a hub of camp life at both Camps Craig and Stahlman. Each trading post is well-stocked with supplies for merit badge classes, t-shirts, hats, knives, mugs, flashlights, Aerobie light-up discs, soft drinks, water, ice cream, snacks, and a camp favorite, refillable ICEEs in stadium cups!

Trading Post hours are posted outside each facility but are generally open daily from 8:30 am — 9:00 pm with the exception of Wednesdays when trading posts close at 5:00 pm. Hours may change as camp schedules demand.

The Trading Post Meal Deal is available every <u>Tuesday</u> during lunch and includes a large all-beef hamburger or brat. Tickets are available at the Trading Post.

Scouts visit the trading posts often throughout the week for refreshments, fun, and supplies. Please send money with your Scout if you wish for this to be part of his/her experience. We highly recommend that troops establish a troop banking system with an adult leader as banker in order to help safeguard and distribute money that the Scouts bring to camp. We cannot be responsible for lost or stolen personal items. We do accept all major credit cards.

We appreciate having adult leaders make random and frequent visits to the trading posts for a bit of extra supervision. We also encourage adult leaders to periodically accompany their scouts to the trading post to help model and encourage honest and mature behavior. Scouts are asked to leave backpacks outside of the trading post while shopping. Please help us enforce this to make it easier for trading post staff. Shoplifting carries severe and immediate punishment.



# Alcohol, Tobacco and Drug Policy

Alcoholic beverages and illegal drugs are strictly prohibited on Council properties. Violators will be asked to leave. Scheduled prescription drugs must be placed in the care of personnel at the Health Lodge. If Scout Leaders are not comfortable or need assistance in administering medication, the Health Lodge is available. Scouts are not allowed to smoke or use tobacco at camp. Adults are asked not to smoke around or in sight of Scouts and to always use the designated smoking areas in camp. There is absolutely no smoking in buildings or in tents.

An important way adult leaders can model healthy living is by following the policies on alcohol, tobacco, and drugs. Leaders should support the attitude that they, as well as youths, are better off without tobacco in any form and may not allow the use of tobacco products at any BSA activity involving youth participants. This includes the use of electronic cigarettes, personal vaporizers, or electronic nicotine delivery systems that simulate tobacco smoking.

All Scouting functions, meetings, and activities should be conducted on a smoke-free basis, with smoking areas located away from all participants. As outlined in the Scouter Code of Conduct, Scouting activities are not a place to possess, distribute, transport, consume, or use any of the following items prohibited by law or in violation of any Scouting rules, regulations, and policies: alcoholic beverages or controlled substances, including marijuana.

In addition, the Code of Conduct specifies that if you are taking prescription medications with the potential of impairing any functioning or judgment, you will not engage in activities that would put youth at risk, including driving or operating equipment.
